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1. Introduction

1.1 Overview and Purpose of Report

This report, produced by Ove Arup and Partners Ltd (Arup) on behalf of Tameside Metropolitan Borough Council (the Council), provides a review of the Homes, Spaces, Places – Shaping Tameside for Tomorrow Issues and Options consultation document in relation to the Integrated Assessment (IA).

The purpose of the IA is to promote sustainable development, health and equality issues through better integration of social, environmental and economic considerations into the preparation of the Local Plan. The IA will consider the requirements and scope of the Sustainability Appraisal (SA)/Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA), the Equalities Impact Assessment (EqIA) and the Heath Impact Assessment (HIA). Further information regarding the IA scoping, methodology and framework can be found in the IA Scoping Report.

This review has taken place to ensure that the IA has been fully considered at this stage of the plan making process and that the IA is comprehensively integrated as the Plan is developed. This review is not a legal requirement but is to support and inform the Council at this early stage of consultation. The IA will continue to inform the development of the Plan as work progresses.

1.2 The Tameside Plan

In accordance with the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF), the Council is currently preparing a new plan for the borough, Homes, Spaces, Places – Shaping Tameside for Tomorrow (HSP). HSP will reflect national policy and guidance, and form part of the development plan for Tameside alongside Places for Everyone (PfE), the Greater Manchester Joint Development Plan Document, adopted in March 2024.

HSP will set out the vision, objectives, local planning policies and site allocations that will guide future development in the Borough. Policy included within HSP will encompass overarching themes of urban regeneration, healthy living and sustainability with strategic PfE site allocations and policies with locally focused housing, employment, town centre, green belt, open space, sport and recreation, conservation and historic environment, nature conservation and infrastructure policies specific to Tameside.

HSP will replace the saved policies of the Tameside Unitary Development Plan, adopted in 2004. Development of HSP will be informed by ongoing public and stakeholder consultation, evidence-based work (such as the IA) before it is submitted to the Secretary of State for Examination. If HSP is deemed sound, it will then be adopted as policy for the Borough.

2. Document Review

A review was undertaken on the Issues and Options consultation document to determine how the IA framework has been considered and if there were any opportunities to strengthen the consultation in relation to the IA. This review has taken place to ensure that the IA has been fully considered and integrated into this part of the evidence gathering and plan making process.

The review is shown in Table 1. The table outlines how each IA objective was considered as part of the review, with references included where each topic was considered as part of the consultation document and comments provided to inform the Council on where topics are felt to consider each IA Objective appropriately or if some areas of the consultation could be further strengthened, ensuring that the IA is fully considered and integrated into the consultation document. It is noted that at this early stage of plan preparation it is only possible to apply the IA at a high level.

3. Summary and Next Steps

In summary, this review has found that the Issues and Options consultation document appropriately explores and considers 15 out of the 18 IA Objectives. Three of the IA Objectives (IA Objectives 3, 14 and 18) have been highlighted as areas where the consultation document could be strengthened to ensure that the topics of utility infrastructure, water quality and waste are comprehensively considered within the consultation.

Following consultation, the Council will develop HSP and will hold two further rounds of consultation on the draft Plan in 2025/2026, with submission to the Secretary of State planned for Spring 2026 and adoption planned for Autumn 2026. The IA will continue to inform the development of the draft Plan as work progresses. As part of these consultations, an IA report will be shared to explain the work completed outlining how the IA has been fully considered and is comprehensively integrated as HSP is developed.

6. Summary and Next Steps

In summary, this review has found that the Issues and Options Call for Sites consultation document appropriately explores and considers 13 out of the 18 IA Objectives. Five of the IA Objectives (IA Objectives 4, 5, 12, 15 and 18) are not cross referenced within the Call for Sites consultation document and proposal form. It is felt that these are not relevant to include as part of the consultation document and proposal form, however we would recommend that the Council consider these IA Objectives as part of the Council's assessment of these sites, where possible. In addition, the other actors the Council considers as part of their assessment of sites should also be informed by the IA Objectives too. This will ensure that these topics are comprehensively considered as part of the site assessment work included as part of HSP.

Following consultation, the Council will develop HSP and will hold two further rounds of consultation on the draft Plan in 2025/2026, with submission to the Secretary of State planned for Spring 2026 and adoption planned for Autumn 2026. The IA will continue to inform the development of the draft Plan as work progresses. As part of these consultations, an IA report will be shared to explain the work completed outlining how the IA has been fully considered and is comprehensively integrated as HSP is developed.
